

PROTECT YOURSELF FROM CORONAVIRUS

HOW CORONAVIRUS SPREADS

- 1** Between people who are within 6 feet of each other
Through respiratory droplets when the infected cough or sneeze
By touching surfaces with Coronavirus and then touching your mouth, nose, or eyes



SOCIAL DISTANCING

- 2** Stay at least 6 feet away from all people when outside your home
NO EXCEPTIONS



STAY HOME IF YOU ARE SICK

- 6** FEVER
COUGH
SHORTNESS OF BREATH



COVER YOUR COUGHS & SNEEZES

- 5** Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue
Discard tissue immediately



CLEAN & DISINFECT FREQUENTLY TOUCHED SURFACES

- 4** Always wear gloves while cleaning/disinfecting.
Change gloves when soiled.
First, clean dirty surfaces with soap and water.
Next, use EPA-registered household disinfectants. An include 1/3 cup of bleach per gallon of water. Let disinfectant sit for at least 4 minutes.



WASH HANDS FREQUENTLY

- 3** Wash hands with Soap and Water for at least 20 seconds, air dry or use clean towel.
Use Hand Sanitizer when Soap is not available

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Low Water Elevations

The Lake Worth Drainage District (LWDD) has been receiving phone calls from residents regarding low water conditions in portions of our canal system and stormwater ponds. LWDD has been in communication most of the morning with the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) regarding the current conditions. As you are probably aware, we are entering the peak of south Florida's typical dry season (November to June). However, it appears that we are entering a record low rainfall period. Meteorologists are indicating that this March may be one of the driest on record-- ever! Given the lack of rainfall, SFWMD is experiencing low water levels all across south Florida.

Lake Okeechobee's stage today, March 31, is 11.92' - about two feet below normal for this time of year. LWDD's pumping operations are supporting water levels across most of LWDD's area. However, the C-51 and E-4 canals are low and are controlled by SFWMD. There is no regional water available to bring-in the systems to raise water levels in these canals currently. SFWMD will reconsider the situation again next week. The bottom line is that there is very little that can change the situation other than getting some much-needed rain.
