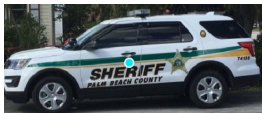

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SWA's OCTOBER HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE TIPS

~ Keep Medications and Needles Out of Recycling Bins ~

If medicines help you, make sure they don't hurt solid waste workers or our environment. Prescription medications and needles should not be thrown into the garbage or recycling bin. They require proper disposal.

Palm Beach County residents can dispose of prescription medications and needles at many locations countywide*.

Prescription Medications

Keep prescription medicines out of the hands of strangers, away from children, and out of the water supply by taking advantage of Operation Pill Drop, a partnership between the SWA, the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office, and many local police departments. *(Continued in next column)*

Operation Pill Drop boxes are located throughout Palm Beach County to provide residents easy drop-off of unwanted or expired medications. Residents may also call the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office at 561-688-3800 for specific instructions. Until you are ready to dispose of unwanted or expired prescription medications, do your part by making sure they are secure.

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MANDATORY 10 DIGIT PHONE NUMBERS, WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Mandatory 10-Digit Dialing FAQs

What will be the new dialing procedure?

To complete all local calls, you will now need to dial area code + telephone number. This applies to all calls within your area code that are currently dialed with seven digits.

Who will be affected?

Anyone with a telephone number from your area code will need to make this change from 7-digit local dialing to 10-digit local dialing.

When will the change begin?

Beginning October 24, 2021, you must dial 10-digits (area code + telephone number) for all local calls. On and after this date, local calls dialed with only 7-digits may not be completed, and a recording will inform you that your call cannot be completed as dialed. You must hang up and dial again using the area code and the 7-digit number. Beginning July 16, 2022, dialing "988" will route your call to the National Suicide Prevention and Mental Health Crisis Lifeline.

What will you need to do?

In addition to changing the way you dial local calls, all services, automatic dialing equipment, or other types of equipment that are programmed to complete calls to 7-digit local numbers will need to be reprogrammed to complete calls to 10-digit numbers. Some examples are life safety systems or medical monitoring devices, PBXs, fax machines, Internet dial-up numbers, fire or burglar alarm and security systems or gates, speed dialers, mobile or other wireless phone contact lists, call forwarding settings, voicemail services and other similar functions. Be sure to check your website, personal and business stationery, advertising materials, personal and business checks, contact information, your personal or pet ID tags, and other such items to ensure the area code is included. What will remain the same?

- Your telephone number, including current area code, will not change.
- The price of a call, coverage area, or other rates and services will not change due to the dialing change.
- What is a local call now will remain a local call regardless of the number of digits dialed.
- You will continue to dial 1+ area code + telephone number for all long distance calls.
- You can still dial just three digits to reach 711 (relay services) and 911 (emergency services).
- Any 211, 311, 411, 511, 611, or 811 services available in your community can still be reached by dialing their three-digit codes.
